- Mining and the discoveries of Gold & Silver attracted many Americans to move West and get rich.

Mining



- Attracted Young, single men
- Desire to strike it rich

Mining in the West

- A few small prospectors made large fortunes
- Most money made by large mining corporations.
- Mining towns had high populations of foreigners.
 - Mexico, England, Ireland, China

Economic Impacts

- The added gold (and silver)
 - Boosted U.S. economy
 - Increased foreign investment
 - Stimulated U.S. involvement in global economy



California Gold Rush

- By the mid 1850s, the California Gold Rush had ended and miners began looking elsewhere.
- Pike's Peak - Gold found in 1858 and by 1859, 50,000 miners were there
- Lodes - veins of rich minerals in the soil dug by machines and companies, not individuals

Discovery of Gold & Silver

- Comstock Lode - Largest silver mine in US, \$700,000,000 in silver brought out in 20 years from a depth of 3200 feet
- Klondike Gold Rush → 1897 → Gold Strike along the Klondike River in the Yukon Territory → 100,000 Americans headed that way → Did not find much gold when they got there.

Community Development

- Mining camps and towns
 - Thousands of men poured into mining areas. Camps were hastily built and had no law enforcement. Vigilante justice was used to combat theft and violence.
- Camps become towns
 - Some camps developed into towns, with hastily constructed buildings of stores and saloons.
 - As towns developed, women and children came to join the men, making the towns more respectable. Townspeople established churches, newspapers, and schools.

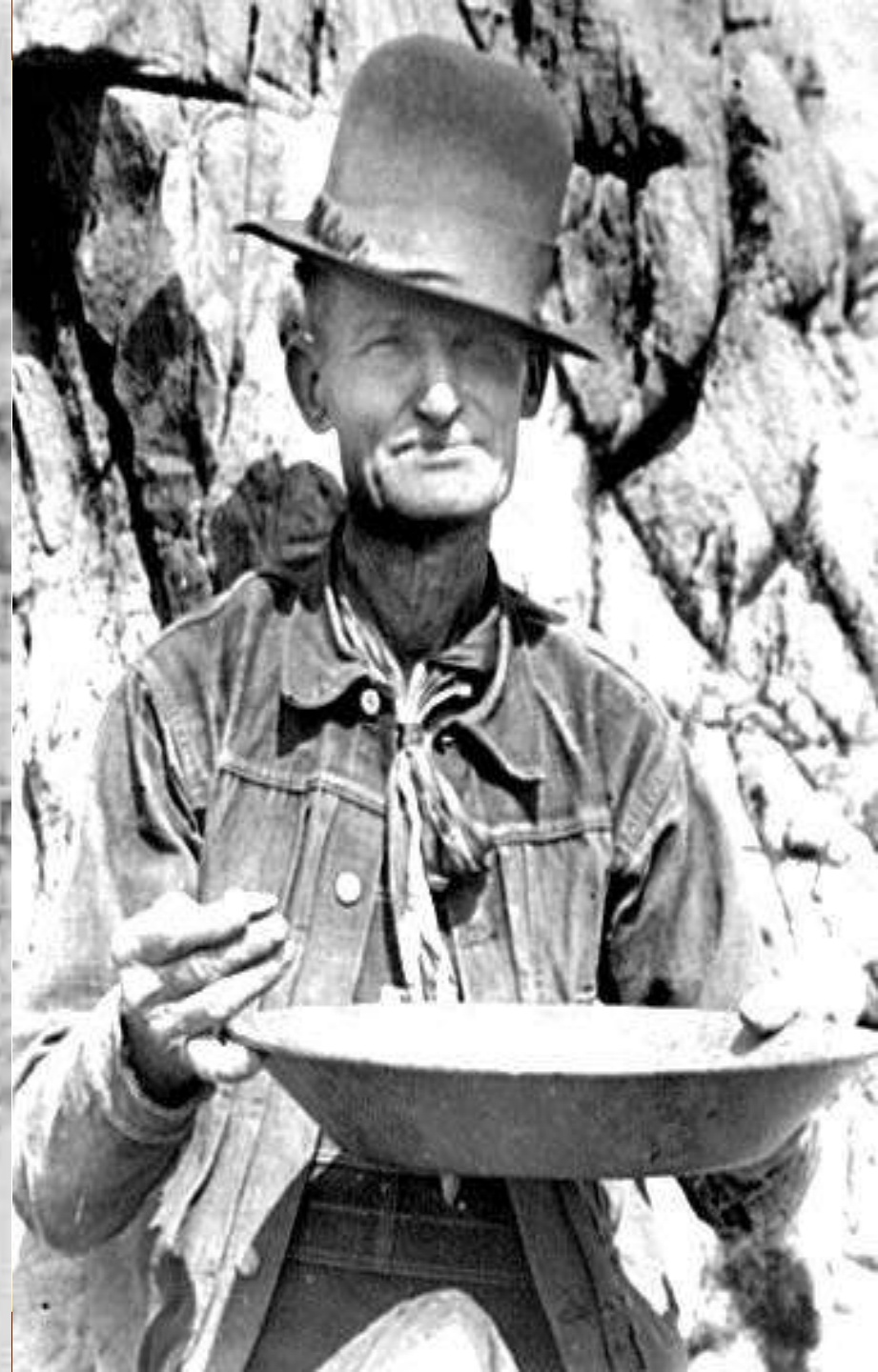

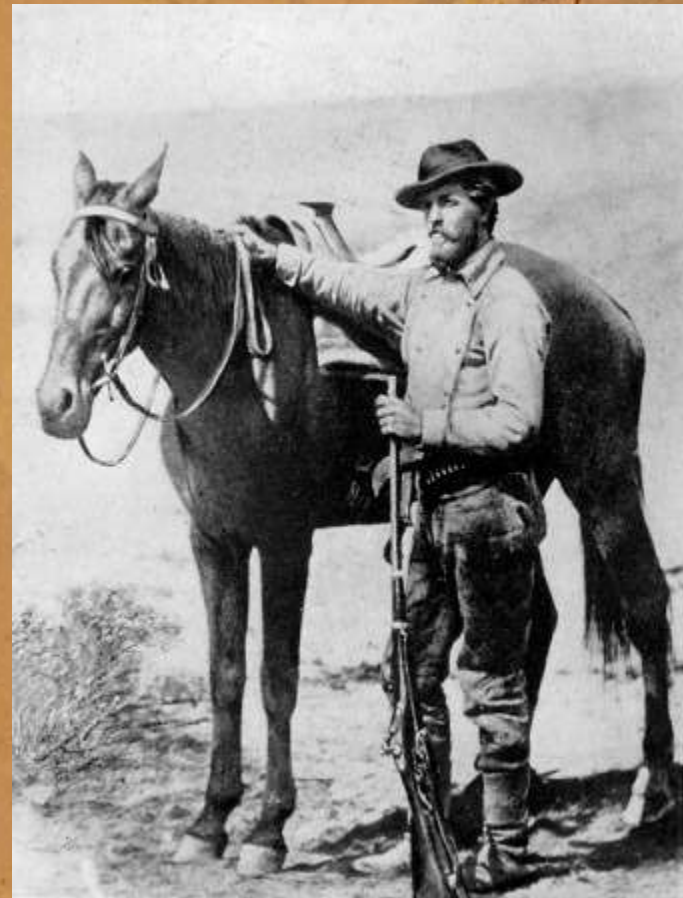

Cowboys & Cattle Drives

- Post Civil War:
 - Eastern cities are left stripped of resources.
 - The country's growing population needs food.
 - In Texas, cattle run wild.
 - Very valuable



Cowboys & Cattle Drives

- The Cowboy emerges
- The drive (guide) cattle to the railroads
- Big Business



Barb Wire

- Used in making fences. (CHEAP!!!!!!!)
- Allows farmers to mark their land & keep wild cattle out.
- Brings about the end of the cattle drives & cowboys on the open range.





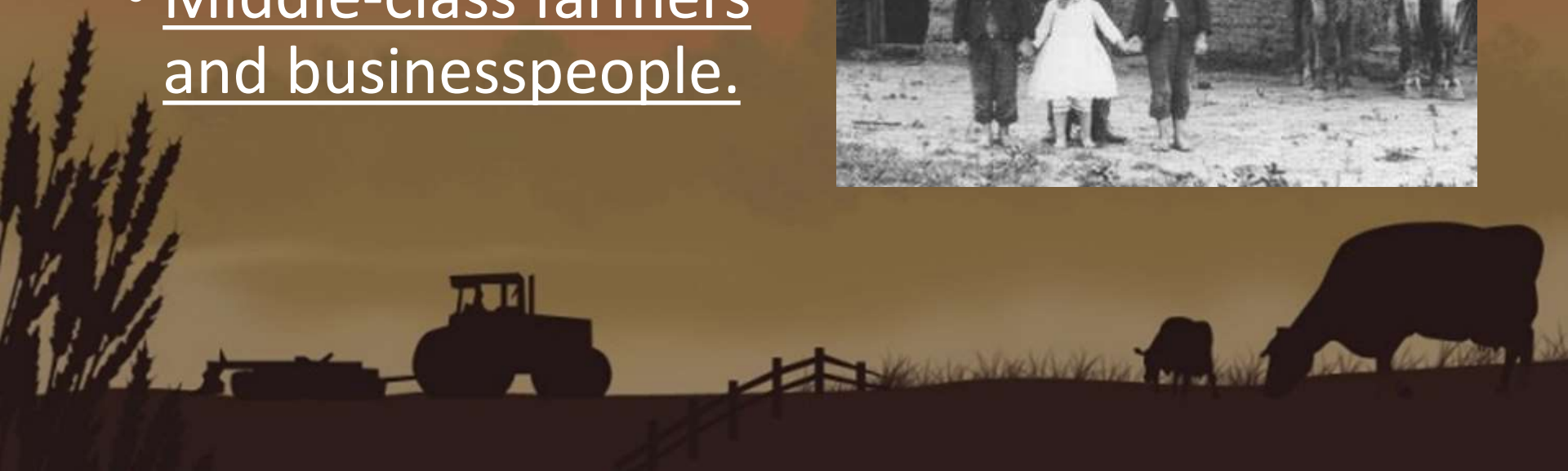

White Settlers

- From the South
 - Trying to avoid the post Civil War South.
 - Ku Klux Klan
- Tried to build their own communities.

- Sweden, Finland, & Russia
- Helped develop a distinct culture in the area



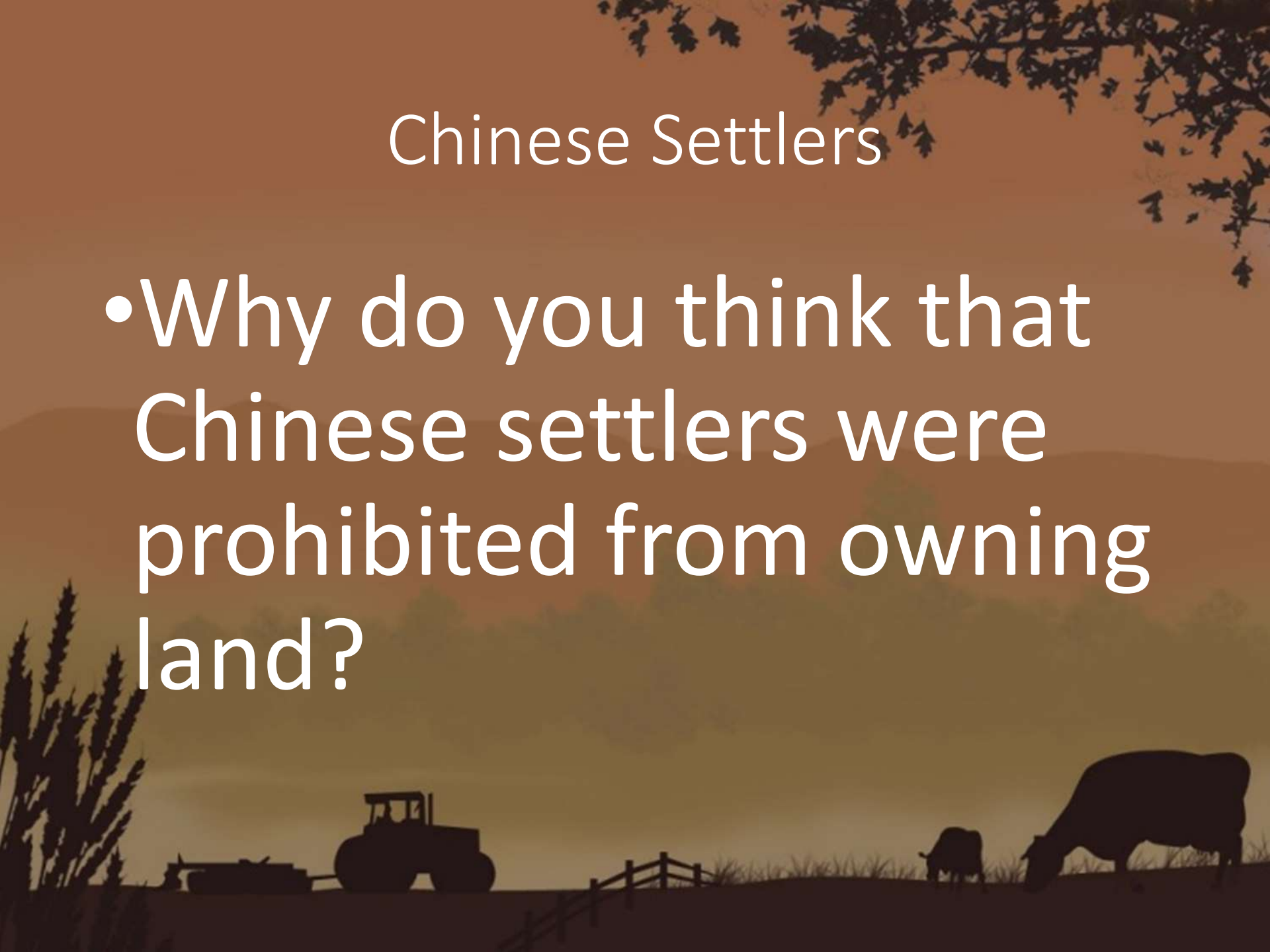
Chinese Settlers

- Why do you think that Chinese settlers were prohibited from owning land?



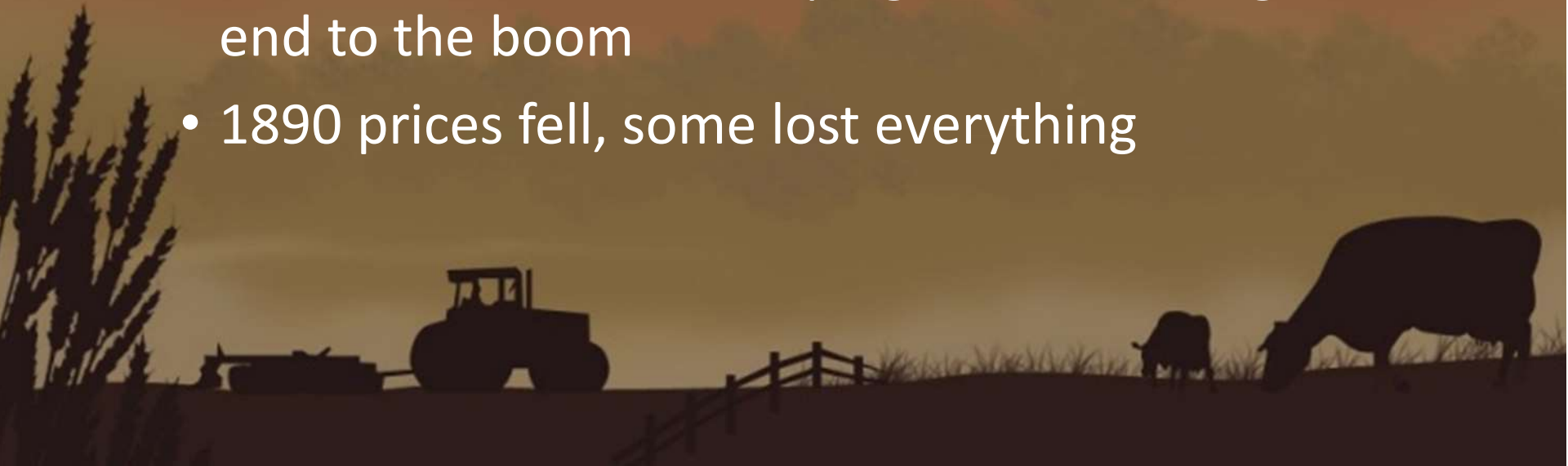
Farming Grows

- Farming became a business.
- Improved farming technologies.
- Led to Bonanza farms:
 - Specialized in a single cash crop
 - The rise of 'agribusiness'.



Bonanza Farms

- 10,000 acre farms
- Wheat boom of the 1880s
- Population in Dakotas tripled
- Overproduction, high investment costs, droughts, and reliance on one-crop agriculture brought an end to the boom
- 1890 prices fell, some lost everything



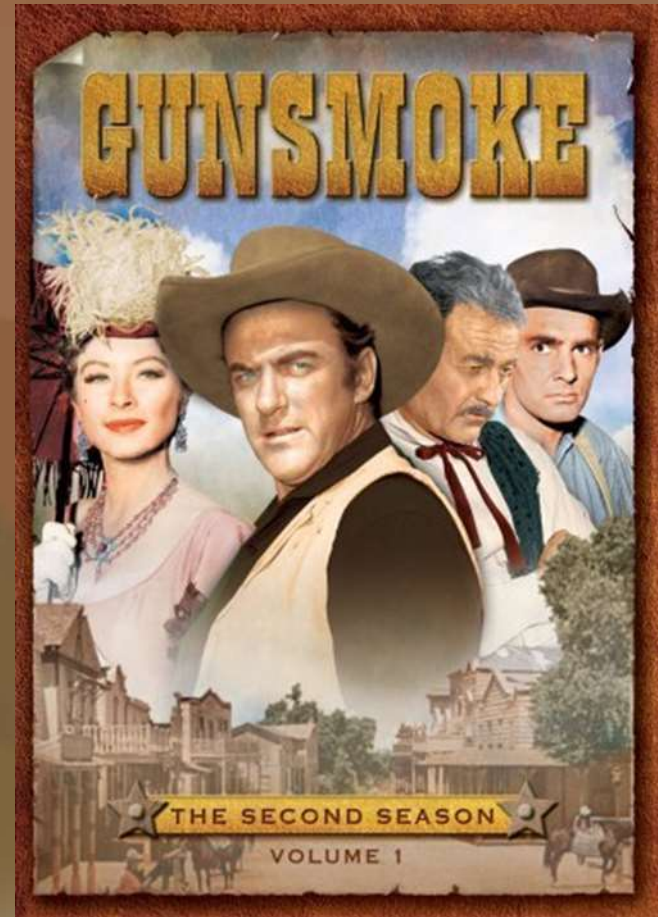
The Wild West

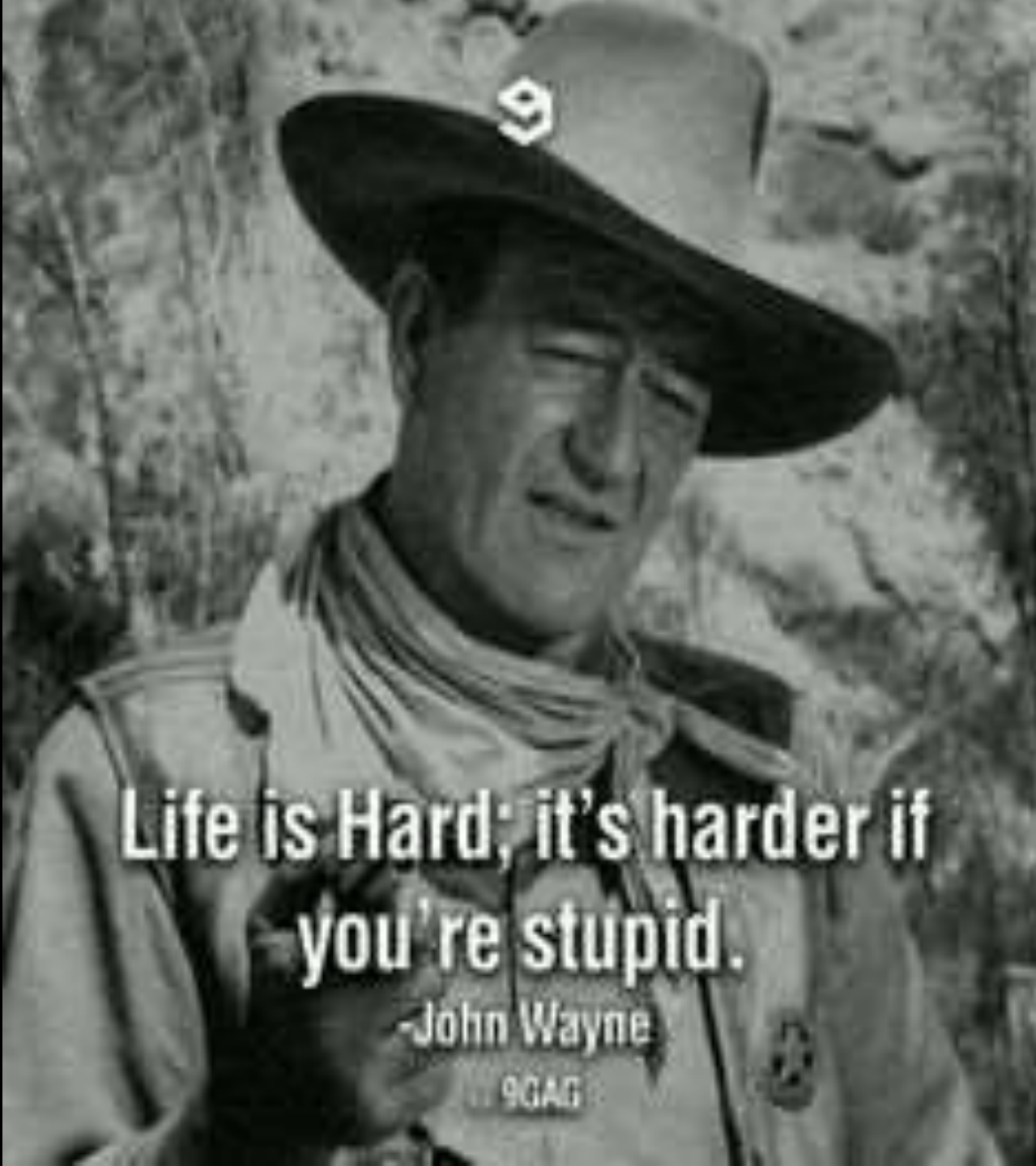


- Gunfights
