• African Americans began migrating out of the South starting in the 1910's in search of economic opportunities (Jobs).









The mob preparing to lynch Jesse Washington, an 18 year-old African American, in front of Waco, Texas, city hall on May 15, 1916

The Migration of African Americans from the American South (1910-1970)




The Great Migration Begins

- <u>World War I is the</u> <u>catalyst for the</u> <u>migration.</u>
- <u>Factory jobs during</u> <u>World War I.</u>
- <u>Migration to major</u> <u>northern cities.</u>



The Great Migration

- 1910 90% of all African Americans lived in the South, and 75% lived on farms.
- WWI 500,000 African Americans moved from the South to Northern cities.
- 1920s 800,000 African Americans moved from Southern states to Northern cities.



Limited Immigration

- <u>In 1918, Congress began passing laws</u> <u>to limit immigration.</u>
- <u>In 1924, Congress passed the</u> <u>Immigration Act, further limiting</u> <u>immigration.</u>
- <u>This caused a decrease in the number</u> of available workers for factory jobs.

Impact on African Americans Industrial jobs that used to be closed to African Americans became accessible because of the labor shortage.

Impact on African Americans

 <u>African Americans in urban</u> areas in the North and West still encountered segregation and other forms of racial discrimination.


African Americans Face Challenges

- In the South, the number of lynchings increased.
- Lynchings→ violent acts of murder, often by mobs.
- The Ku Klux Klan was a white supremacist organization that was responsible for many lynchings.


Raised Expectations

- <u>African Americans expectations were</u> <u>changing because of their involvement in</u> <u>World War I.</u>
- <u>They believed that they had earned their</u> <u>freedom from fighting.</u>
- <u>In some cases, white workers looked to</u> <u>push back.</u>






Newark's Population
